Pollinator Facts

- Pollinators are insects and animals who carry pollen from plant to plant, to enable plants to reproduce, in order for crops, fruits and vegetables to grow.
- Pollinators include thousands of different types of bees, but also birds, butterflies, beetles, wasps, ants, moths, bats and other small animals.
- It is estimated that at least 1/3 (or 1 bite out of every 3 bites) of food humans eat has been provided by pollinators.
- In other words, pollinators are essential. Without them, our food supply and natural ecosystems would collapse!



Build a bug hotel...

It's easy! Collect suitable materials like pieces of wood, tubes, sticks, moss, straw, old tiles/bricks, etc. Add a roof to keep it dry. How YOU can help pollinators!

- Plant bee-friendly plants and flowers. Note that some flowers/plants are genetically altered to not have nectar/pollen, so choose carefully.
- Don't use pesticides they kill insects and reduce food for birds/small animals. Find out how to garden naturally instead.


